Charles F. Lott

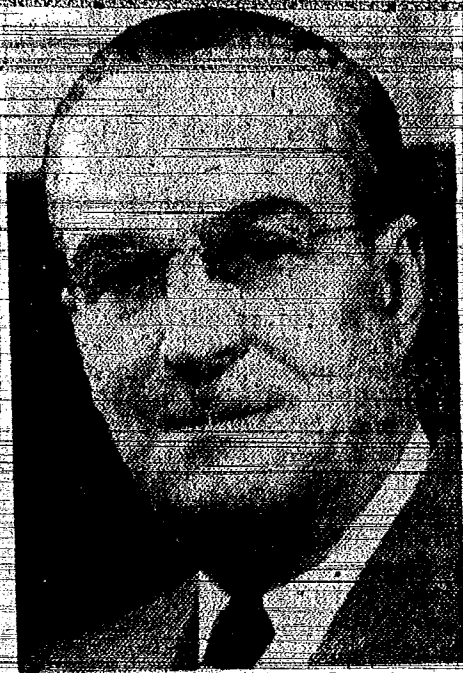
